- Critical and Creative thinking


What skills does it improve?



- Motion is the issue of parliamentary debate
- It is a proposition, and not a question
- The proposition team supports the motion. The opposition team opposes the motion.
- Value or policy motions


"This House believes that the developed world should bear the burden of fighting climate change"

The Motion




- 2 teams (Prop Team - Opp Team)

- 4 debaters for team

The two teams will alternate presenting their four speeches:




3' For speech






- Goals:




#### Judging

Who does not debate will judge


- Active listening to the debate




**Motion Analysis** 



#### 1. Context


- What is the world in which this debate is taking place?
- Why is this debate pertinent to the current state of affairs?
- What are the relevant events behind the motion?
- What are the motion's actual instances and controversies?

Motion Analysis: Context



- urban and ecological challenges (road infrastructures, pollution, city economies...)
- background within which the debate takes place (the growing needs for roads, impact on the health...)



## 2. Core questions and stances

- What are the essential questions that the motion poses?
- What are the viewpoints of those who support and oppose the motion's key points?

Motion Analysis: Core questions and stances




protect the environment



#### 3. Characterization

- How are stakeholders and players involved in the motion?
- What are their motivations and economic capabilities?
- How will they react to the motion?
- Who will be impacted by the motion?
- What are the current social tendencies in relation to the motion?
- What terminology will we use to explain the answers to the preceding questions?


Motion Analysis: Characterization



#### stakeholders:

- ar manufacturers
- economic centers
- ☐ their employers and employees
- government
- How will the groups interact with each other?
- What will the dynamics of power be?



## 4. Counterfactuals and Comparatives

- What are the specific, unique and exclusive characteristics of the worlds that the proposing team and the opposing team will defend in the debate?
- What is the worldview proposed by prop team? What is the worldview proposed by opp team?

Motion Analysis: Counterfactuals and Comparatives




#### **Prop Team**

- Need an alternative to the car
- A significant decrease in CO2 emissions

#### Opp Team

- There is no need for an alternative
- Car pollution remains



#### 5. Concepts

- What ideals are at stake?
- What is the value framework through which prop team considers opp team?
- What is the moral, ethical, and ideological background of the two perspectives?

Motion Analysis: Concepts




#### **Prop Team**

- support environment for future generations
- an individual does not have the right to own a car if mass transportation is an alternative

#### Opp Team

- safeguard present generations' economic opportunities
- individuals should have the right to use flexible modes of transportation



#### 6. Clashes


What are the main points of clash and disagreement amongst supporters and opponents of the motion?

Motion Analysis: Clashes



- efficiency of the ban on the circulation of cars in cities
- real probability of an alternative to cars
- individual responsibility



#### 7. Contents

- What are the arguments that we can draw from the analysis we have done?
- What arguments will the proposition team choose to prove that their position is more valid than the opposing team position?
- What arguments could show that the opposition team's worldview is preferable to the proposition team's worldview?

Motion Analysis: Contents



#### **Prop Team**

- banning cars in cities helps the environment
- banning cars in cities will create the opportunity for a better alternative
- good impact on individuals

#### Opp Team

- banning cars in cities does not benefit the environment
- efficient mass transportation is not actually practicable
- negative impact on the city's economy


#3. Teamworking



#### 1° Prop.

- defining the motion
- outlining own team's case
- presenting the first argument

#3. The Role of the speakers




## 1°Opp.

- (if needed) challenging the prop definition providing a new one
- outlining own team's case
- rebuttal
- presenting the team's first argument




#### 2° Prop. and Opp.

- continuing the argumentation
- defending their first speaker's argument
- rebuttalling to the other team's case
- making new arguments




#### 3° Prop. and Opp.

- responding to the other team
- rebutting other team's rebuttal




Reply speeches  $4^{\circ}$  Opp. and Prop.




